Nice Classification of Goods and Services for Trade Marks

New Zealand follows the 9th edition of the Nice Classification of Goods and Services for Trade Marks, which is maintained by the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO). Trade marks registered in New Zealand since 1 January 2007 are recorded on the IPONZ database as being applied for or registered under **Classification System 9**, referring to the current edition of Nice Classification.

Prior to 1 January 2007 IPONZ defined the *version* of classification system, that a trade mark is registered in respect to, as either **schedule 3, 4, 6 or 8** – a reference to the corresponding Schedule of the New Zealand Trade Marks Regulations 1954.

Schedule 8 covers trade marks applied for between 20 August 2002 and 31 December 2006.

Schedule 6 covers trade marks applied for between 7 January 2002 and 19 August 2003. Schedule 6 was in effect the 8th edition of the Nice Classification and it corresponds directly to IPONZ's **Classification System 8**. Please note that all application filed under Schedule 6 have been re-indexed to appear as Classification System 8.

Schedule 4 covers trade marks applied for between 11 December 1941 and 6 January 2002 (unless the proprietor of the mark has requested conversion to schedule 6).

Schedule 3 covers trade mark applied for prior to 11 December 1941 (unless the proprietor of the mark has requested conversion to schedule 4).

Class Headings - Nice Classification (9th Edition)

Part I: Classes of Goods

1. Chemicals used in industry, science and photography, as well as in agriculture, horticulture and forestry; unprocessed artificial resins, unprocessed plastics; manures; fire extinguishing compositions; tempering and soldering preparations; chemical substances for preserving foodstuffs; tanning substances; adhesives used in industry.
2. Paints, varnishes, lacquers; preservatives against rust and against deterioration of wood; colorants; mordants; raw natural resins; metals in foil and powder form for painters, decorators, printers and artists.
3. Bleaching preparations and other substances for laundry use; cleaning, polishing, scouring and abrasive preparations; soaps; perfumery, essential oils, cosmetics, hair lotions; dentifrices.
4. Industrial oils and greases; lubricants; dust absorbing, wetting and binding compositions; fuels (including motor spirit) and illuminants; candles and wicks for lighting.

Pharmaceutical and veterinary preparations; sanitary preparations for medical purposes; dietetic substances adapted for medical use, food for babies; plasters, materials for dressings; material for stopping teeth, dental wax; disinfectants; preparations for destroying vermin; fungicides, herbicides.
6. Common metals and their alloys; metal building materials; transportable buildings of metal; materials of metal for railway tracks; non-electric cables and wires of common metal; ironmongery, small items of metal hardware; pipes and tubes of metal; safes; goods of common metal not included in other classes; ores.
7. Machines and machine tools; motors and engines (except for land vehicles); machine coupling and transmission components (except for land vehicles); agricultural implements other than hand-operated; incubators for eggs.
8. Hand tools and implements (hand-operated); cutlery; side arms; razors.
9. Scientific, nautical, surveying, photographic, cinematographic, optical, weighing, measuring, signalling, checking (supervision), life-saving and teaching apparatus and instruments; apparatus and instruments for conducting, switching, transforming, accumulating, regulating or controlling electricity; apparatus for recording, transmission or reproduction of sound or images; magnetic data carriers, recording discs; automatic vending machines and mechanisms for coin-operated apparatus; cash registers, calculating machines, data processing equipment and computers; fire-extinguishing apparatus.
10. Surgical, medical, dental and veterinary apparatus and instruments, artificial limbs, eyes and teeth; orthopedic articles; suture materials.
11. Apparatus for lighting, heating, steam generating, cooking, refrigerating, drying, ventilating, water supply and sanitary purposes.
12. Vehicles; apparatus for locomotion by land, air or water.
13. Firearms; ammunition and projectiles; explosives; fireworks.
14. Precious metals and their alloys and goods in precious metals or coated therewith, not included in other classes; jewellery, precious stones; horological and chronometric instruments.
15. Musical instruments.
16. Paper, cardboard and goods made from these materials, not included in other classes; printed matter; bookbinding material; photographs; stationery; adhesives for stationery or household purposes; artists' materials; paint brushes; typewriters and office requisites (except furniture); instructional and teaching material (except apparatus); plastic materials for packaging (not included in other classes); printers' type; printing blocks.
17. Rubber, gutta-percha, gum, asbestos, mica and goods made from these materials and not included in other classes; plastics in extruded form for use in manufacture; packing, stopping and insulating materials; flexible pipes, not of metal.
18. Leather and imitations of leather, and goods made of these materials and not included in other classes; animal skins, hides; trunks and travelling bags; umbrellas, parasols and walking sticks; whips, harness and saddlery.
19. Building materials (non-metallic); non-metallic rigid pipes for building; asphalt, pitch and bitumen; non-metallic transportable buildings; monuments, not of metal.
20. Furniture, mirrors, picture frames; goods (not included in other classes) of wood, cork, reed, cane, wicker, horn, bone, ivory, whalebone, shell, amber, mother-of-pearl, meerschaum and substitutes for all these materials, or of plastics.
21. Household or kitchen utensils and containers; combs and sponges; brushes (except paint brushes); brush-making materials; articles for cleaning purposes; steelwool; unworked or semi-worked glass (except glass used in building); glassware, porcelain and earthenware not included in other classes.
22. Ropes, string, nets, tents, awnings, tarpaulins, sails, sacks and bags (not included in other classes); padding and stuffing materials (except of rubber or plastics); raw fibrous textile materials.
23. Yarns and threads, for textile use.
24. Textiles and textile goods, not included in other classes; bed and table covers.
25. Clothing, footwear, headgear.
26. Lace and embroidery, ribbons and braid; buttons, hooks and eyes, pins and needles; artificial flowers.
27. Carpets, rugs, mats and matting, linoleum and other materials for covering existing floors; wall hangings (non-textile).
28. Games and playthings; gymnastic and sporting articles not included in other classes; decorations for Christmas trees.
29. Meat, fish, poultry and game; meat extracts; preserved, frozen, dried and cooked fruits and vegetables; jellies, jams, compotes; eggs, milk and milk products; edible oils and fats.
30. Coffee, tea, cocoa, sugar, rice, tapioca, sago, artificial coffee; flour and preparations made from cereals, bread, pastry and confectionery, ices; honey, treacle; yeast, baking-powder; salt, mustard; vinegar, sauces (condiments); spices; ice.
31. Agricultural, horticultural and forestry products and grains not included in other classes; live animals; fresh fruits and vegetables; seeds, natural plants and flowers; foodstuffs for animals, malt.
32. Beers; mineral and aerated waters and other non-alcoholic drinks; fruit drinks and fruit juices; syrups and other preparations for making beverages.
33. Alcoholic beverages (except beers).
34. Tobacco; smokers' articles; matches.
35. Advertising; business management; business administration; office functions.

Patent Cooperation Treaty System (PCT)

PCT Fees

The Patents Amendment Act 1992 (apart from sections 3, 8, and 11, which came into force on 19 August 1992) and the Patents (Patent Cooperation Treaty) Regulations 1992 came into force on 1 July 1998.

The Patent Cooperation Schedule of Fees has been amended with effect from 1 January 2002. The revised schedule of fees is as follows.

The International Phase:

New Zealand component

The transmittal fee for each international application:

NZD \$180.00 + \$22.50 (GST) = \$202.50

Preparation and dispatch of a priority document to International Bureau on applicant's request: no fee

Preparation of a copy of the certified international application and subsequent amendments at the applicant's request:

NZD \$30.00 + \$3.75 (GST) = \$33.75

The cheque for the payment for any fees under the heading **New Zealand component** should be made out to the **Ministry of Economic Development**.

International component

That is, when paying fees which cover both types, **TWO SEPARATE CHEQUES MUST BE PROVIDED**.
- Enclose all International Patent Cooperation Treaty applications and subsequent mail in an envelope clearly marked PCT.
- Please remember that the sheets provided as International Patent Cooperation Treaty applications must be in pristine condition, therefore have no creases, cracks, folds or staple holes.

Navigation

Searching

The Find facility in Adobe Acrobat is of limited functionality. Please note that a version of Adobe Acrobat 5.0 and 7.0 exists with an added search engine which can take advantage of the index which now appears in the folder INDEX on this CD.

A version of Adobe Acrobat with this facility is available on this CD in directory Acrobat. If you wish to take advantage of this facility and have a Windows or NT PC you should install the version of Acrobat Reader on this CD.

After installing this version of Acrobat you should start Acrobat up and ensure that :

The index on the CD is selected using File, Search, Select Indexes, Add (it is located as INDEX.PDX in the folder INDEX). If you have relocated the files you should ensure that the index folder is in the same directory as the Journal pdf files.

That File, Preferences, Search has the "Search fields" box checked. This will allow you to specify any particular Journal to search using the journal number in the Keywords field.

Given this you should be able to search the journals. The help file for the Search module is included, the main points being that wild cards are ? (single character substitution) and * (multiple - including nil - character substitution).
