Patents and designs commentary

We received a total of 6,039 patent applications in the 2017/2018 financial year. 4,033 of these were PCT national phase applications (more than 66% of all applications examined). It is likely the majority of the applications will request examination either as a result of a direction from IPONZ or in most cases self-requesting on their own initiative before the 5 year deadline.

IPONZ's experience to date is that about 80% of directions result in a request for examination. Due to the higher than expected number of self-requests, the number of directions is lower than what we had expected it would be under the 2013 Patents Act.

We are tracking the turnaround time for examination requests on our <u>website</u>. The turnaround time over the last year has steadily decreased.

The volume of applications requesting expedited examination under the Global Patent Prosecution Highway pilot has been higher than expected, which suggests the benefits of this system to applicants.

The New Zealand PCT Receiving Office is currently taking part in a fee netting pilot run in collaboration between the EPO and WIPO.

Consultation is underway for <u>Disclosure of Origin requirements</u>. This closes Friday 21 December 2018.

Design volumes remain stable and we draw your attention to the <u>Review of the Copyright Act 1994: Issues</u> <u>Paper</u> which includes designs. Submissions close 5 April 2019.

Trade Marks and Geographical Indications commentary

Trade mark filings continue to grow with a record 50,360 trade mark classes filed in the 2017/18 year. Year to date trade mark filings are already 7% ahead of last year.

The challenge this year is meeting the 15 day turnaround time for examination with the increased trade mark filings following a record year last financial year. This has meant a number of international registrations have not been examined in 15 days with some being examined within 2 months of IPONZ receiving them. The team is currently working on strategies to return to the 15 day turnaround.

A highlight was New Zealand chairing this year's <u>Madrid</u> working group in Geneva. We also continue to participate in the WIPO fellowship programme where our trade mark examiners can work in Geneva for up to two years.

The Trade Marks Māori Advisory Committee assessed 628 trade marks in the calendar year 2018 compared to 390 in 2017. The increased volume assessed by the Committee is a result of a changed office practice to send geographical place names to the Committee. We saw an increase from 8 % to 11% in 2018 of applications that were considered to be offensive. Māori Advisory Committee members spoke at a number of IP related conferences this year.

For the second successive year we were awarded number one in our online capabilities by industry publication, *World Trade Mark Review*. We thank you for your support which made this possible.

The Geographical Indications <u>register</u> grew slowly this year as predicted. As part of <u>negotiations</u> for a free trade agreement with the European Union, the EU has presented New Zealand with a list of names which are protected in the EU as geographical indications.

Plant Variety Rights commentary

The total number of PVRs has remained at a similar level over the last few years while applications for fruit varieties continue to increase. We've noticed that registrations for ornamentals have continued to steadily decline while agricultural variety applications have remained stable.

We have filed a more detailed country report with UPOV.

We have been working with our colleagues from the Business Law team within the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) on the <u>Plant Variety Rights 1987 Act review</u>.

The PVR Act is over 30 years old, and the plant breeding industry has changing significantly in this time.

We've provided technical assistance and training to the Plant Variety Protection and Distinct, Uniform and Stable (DUS) Testing International Training Course organised by Korean International Cooperation Agency and the Korean Seed and Variety Service in Republic of Korea

IPONZ continues to play an active role in the International Union for the Protection of New Varieties of Plants (UPOV). This includes Council, the Administrative and Legal Committee, the Technical Committee and the Technical Working Parties for Agriculture, for Fruit and for Ornamentals.

Hearings commentary

There are currently 550 active proceedings with the Hearings Office. This is high but to be expected given the increase in trade mark filings. We are looking to recruit additional Hearings Officers in 2019. In 2017/18, five hearings decisions were appealed to the Court. The Hearings Office issued new practice guidelines to create standard pre-hearing directions for IPONZ hearings as well as new costs awards in <u>trade marks</u> and <u>patents</u> proceedings.

OurPeople2018

This year IPONZ undertook a people project – *OurPeople2018* – aimed at ensuring that we have the right capability, capacity and structure to deliver the breadth of services; we invest in our people to cultivate and retain talent and support future succession; and we enhance our positive and engaged culture. As part of *OurPeople2018*, we introduced a new structure for IPONZ, developed a capability framework for all roles and enhanced our staff training and progression frameworks for Examiners/Hearings Case Officers.

IPONZ has put a lot of effort into offering a flexible work environment for our people and is looking forward to rolling out a fully flexible workplace in January 2019.

Fees review

We undertook a <u>fees review</u> for patents and trade marks. We anticipate that new fees will be implemented in August 2019. In the meantime, IPONZ will begin working on the items in the fees review discussion document which received endorsement from submitters for improvements to trade mark services namely (Table 3 of the fees review discussion document) which included: IT upgrades; information and education; international relations; and compliance and enforcement activities.

IP awareness - education and information

In May 2018 IPONZ launched '<u>Dream it. Do it. Own it.</u>' – a targeted programme that aims to grow IP awareness customers across New Zealand.

The IPONZ home page was refreshed to deliver on this strategy, and new resources were developed and delivered across 'customer journey touchpoints'. The strategy uses real Kiwi business case studies, to illustrate IP concepts and demonstrate the value of registered IP to small businesses.

The programme launched in May 2018, with a refresh of the IPONZ homepage to feature the business interviews, new <u>social media</u> channels and new materials and approaches across customer touch points. Launched as part of the national programme of MBIE business roadshows, IPONZ saw an immediate 6-7% spike in new website users. 986 people attended the roadshows, exit interviews concluded that the IPONZ session was the most valuable in the programme (mid-point survey July 2018).

We also hosted a successful event alongside the New Zealand Institute of Patent Attorneys (<u>NZIPA</u>) and the Intellectual Property Society of Australia and New Zealand (<u>IPSANZ</u>) on WIPO World IP Day <u>Powering Change:</u> <u>Women in Innovation</u>.
