The presentation will highlight some of the recent developments in the PCT including ePCT, the WIPO online service that provides secure electronic interaction with international applications maintained by the International Bureau, as well as a simple, intuitive interface for online filing of international applications.

WIPO cooperates with intellectual property (IP) offices, users and other stakeholders to develop shared IP tools, services, standards, databases and platforms. This technical infrastructure is designed to help IP institutions collaborate more effectively and deliver more efficient services to their users; as well as enabling innovators and information-seekers worldwide to freely access the knowledge contained in the IP system. Infrastructure includes WIPO databases, such as PATENTSCOPE, Global Brand Database and the Global Design Database, each of which enables to consult large international and national collections of patents, trademarks and designs, respectively. Infrastructure also includes platforms for the secure exchange of key information among IP offices (DAS, CASE), as well as dedicated fora bringing together stakeholders in areas such as neglected tropical diseases (WIPO RE:SEARCH) or green technologies (WIPO GREEN)
